Adjustment Level:	Lower Intermediate-Advance
Target Skill to be improved:	Speaking and Reasoning
Title:	Debate is Fun (Free conversation)
Topic for Debate:	Alcohol should be illegal

Introduction: This lesson gives the student more speaking opportunities in expressing his thoughts that would improve his/her speaking and reasoning skills. The student would also learn various expressions for agreeing and disagreeing.



Resolved: That alcohol should be illegal.



IDEA GENERATOR



- Alcohol is a contributory factor to a huge proportion of crimes.
- Alcohol is just as potentially addictive as many illegal drugs. Those who do become addicted to alcohol often lose their marriages, jobs, families, even their lives.
- A large proportion of homeless people find themselves in that position as a result of their alcoholism. Any drug this addictive and destructive should be illegal.

Cons

- The main reason why the case of alcohol is different from that of other drugs is a social one rather than an empirical fact about the nature of the drug. Alcohol, unlike other drugs, is socially entrenched.
- At worst, alcohol may slightly exaggerate these tendencies but that makes it the occasion not the underlying cause of violent crimes.
- Not only would banning alcohol infringe people's civil liberties to an unacceptable degree, it would also put thousands of people out of work.

See for example:

Person A: "In my opinion, I believe that alcohol should be illegal because according to one of the research works that I read in Breaking News English, alcohol is more dangerous than illegal drugs."

Person B: "I strongly disagree with the proposition since I believe that alcohol, if drank moderately is healthy. Thus, we need to have alcohol intake even once a week."

Expressions for Agreeing and Disagreeing

Asking for an opinon	 What's your idea? What are your thoughts on all of this? How do you feel about that? Do you have anything to say about this? What do you think? Do you agree? Wouldn't you say?
Expressing agreement	 I agree with you 100 percent. I couldn't agree with you more. That's so true. That's for sure. (slang) Tell me about it! You're absolutely right. Absolutely. That's exactly how I feel. Exactly. I'm afraid I agree with James. I have to side with Dad on this one. No doubt about it. (agree with negative statement) Me neither. (weak) I suppose so./I guess so. You have a point there. I was just going to say that.
Expressing disagreement	 I don't think so. (strong) No way. I'm afraid I disagree. (strong) I totally disagree. I beg to differ. (strong) I'd say the exact opposite. Not necessarily. That's not always true. That's not always the case.

	No, I'm not so sure about that.
Interruptions	 Can I add something here? Is it okay if I jump in for a second? If I might add something Can I throw my two cents in? Sorry to interrupt, but (after accidentally interrupting someone) Sorry, go ahead. OR Sorry, you were saying (after being interrupted) You didn't let me finish.
Settling an argument	 Let's just move on, shall we? Let's drop it. I think we're going to have to agree to disagree. (sarcastic) Whatever you say./If you say so.
