Title: Debate is Fun (Free conversation)

Topic for Debate: Do the benefits of joining the Euro outweigh the

cost?

Introduction: This lesson gives the student more speaking opportunities in expressing his thoughts that would improve his/her speaking and reasoning skills. The student would also learn various expressions for agreeing and disagreeing.



Resolved: Do the benefits of joining the Euro outweigh the costs?



IDEA GENERATOR

Pros

- It is hard to enjoy full membership of a single market without also participating in a single currency.
- Remaining outside the euro disadvantages businesses who are forced to compete with euromember ones which have reduced transactions costs of exchange rate fluctuations.
- The euro will provide a challenge to the supremacy of the dollar, making worldwide investment less dependent on the vagaries of one country's economy."

Cons

- It is a fallacy to assume that merely showing that prices differ will force unofficial harmonisation.
- Businesses who trade outside the euro-zone will still have to account for international currency market fluctuations, which they can protect against by hedging or forward currency trading of euros as well
- Monetary inflexibility is extremely dangerous, given that asymmetric shocks will become more likely as the EU expands.

You have a point there. I was just going to say that.
Expressing disagreement	 I don't think so. (strong) No way. I'm afraid I disagree. (strong) I totally disagree. I beg to differ. (strong) I'd say the exact opposite. Not necessarily. That's not always true. That's not always the case. No, I'm not so sure about that.
Interruptions	Can I add something here?Is it okay if I jump in for a second?

	 If I might add something Can I throw my two cents in? Sorry to interrupt, but (after accidentally interrupting someone) Sorry, go ahead. OR Sorry, you were saying (after being interrupted) You didn't let me finish.
Settling an argument	 Let's just move on, shall we? Let's drop it. I think we're going to have to agree to disagree. (sarcastic) Whatever you say./If you say so.
