Target Skill to be improved: Speaking and Reasoning

Title: Debate is Fun (Free conversation)

Topic for Debate: Should a cap be placed on the level of foreign

investment in a country's business and land?

Introduction: This lesson gives the student more speaking opportunities in expressing his thoughts that would improve his/her speaking and reasoning skills. The student would also learn various expressions for agreeing and disagreeing.



Resolved: Should a cap be placed on the level of foreign investment in a country's businesses and land?



IDEA GENERATOR



- Economic Growth is best when it comes from within
- Putting a cap on foreign investment and so reducing the likelihood of a bubble economy developing acts as a spur to local investors to invest their money in the home economy.
- A cap would insulate the home economy from the extremities of the global economy.
- A cap makes a clear connection between national policy objectives and the economy.

Cons

- A cap would reduce inward investment. At the straightforward level of analysis, imposing a cap means limiting the amount of inward investment.
- The message a cap sends out will scare off investors.
- A cap would raise the cost of capital and so slow the economy.

See for example:

Person A: "In my opinion, I believe that a cap would insulate the home economy from the extremities of the global economy".

Person B: "I strongly disagree with the proposition since I believe that a cap would reduce inward investment".

Expressions for Agreeing and Disagreeing

Stating an opinion	 In my opinion The way I see it If you want my honest opinion According to Lisa As far as I'm concerned If you ask me
Asking for an opinon	 What's your idea? What are your thoughts on all of this? How do you feel about that? Do you have anything to say about this? What do you think? Do you agree? Wouldn't you say?
Expressing agreement	 I agree with you 100 percent. I couldn't agree with you more. That's so true. That's for sure. (slang) Tell me about it! You're absolutely right. Absolutely. That's exactly how I feel. Exactly. I'm afraid I agree with James. I have to side with Dad on this one. No doubt about it. (agree with negative statement) Me neither. (weak) I suppose so./I guess so. You have a point there. I was just going to say that.
Expressing disagreement	 I don't think so. (strong) No way. I'm afraid I disagree. (strong) I totally disagree. I beg to differ. (strong) I'd say the exact opposite. Not necessarily. That's not always true. That's not always the case. No, I'm not so sure about that.
Interruptions	Can I add something here?Is it okay if I jump in for a second?

	 If I might add something Can I throw my two cents in? Sorry to interrupt, but (after accidentally interrupting someone) Sorry, go ahead. OR Sorry, you were saying (after being interrupted) You didn't let me finish.
Settling an argument	 Let's just move on, shall we? Let's drop it. I think we're going to have to agree to disagree. (sarcastic) Whatever you say./If you say so.
